

## **Research Partnership Roundtable**

There are great opportunities to build on relationships between community legal centres and researchers, to ensure meaningful access to justice across Australia.

Each year, Australia's community legal centres provide legal help to over 200,000 vulnerable people, across family, criminal and civil law. Our data collection tool collects more than fifty different types of information about each client, and our legal work covers a large number of legal areas. This is a rich and underused resource for researchers interested in how real people experience the law, its structures and processes.

This inaugural research partnerships roundtable, co-hosted by NACLC and QAILS, will showcase successful research collaborations between community legal centres and research organisations, discuss possible funding sources and opportunities, discuss current community legal centre research projects, and ignite conversations about possible research opportunities.

The Research Partnerships Roundtable will bring together community legal centres with researchers and academics, to identify opportunities for collaboration and partnership in research projects.

The keynote presentation will be delivered by **Professor Rosalind Croucher AM** President of the Australian Law Reform Commission.

A highlight of the event will be the networking lunch, held at the conclusion of the formal program. The lunch provides attendees with a fantastic opportunity to network with presenters, panellists and each other.

This inaugural Research Partnerships Roundtable is jointly hosted by NACLC and QAILS. It will be the first of a number of national Research Partnership Roundtables arranged by NACLC for CLCs and academics across Australia.
