The 'Blurred Borders' material is a set of visual resources that use plain English, pictures, storytelling and other communication tools to help people working in the legal system strengthen their communication skills and connect well with clients, audiences and other stakeholders.

The project was a collaboration between 8 legal services in the 'cross-border' region of NT/WA and worked with services and regional and remote communities in the area between Katherine, Kununurra, Balgo and Lajamanu from 2016 to 2018. It built on prior work in the region on plain language legal definitions and storytelling and visual aids to illustrate legal concepts and processes.

Though developed in remote and regional NT and WA, it has been used and is adaptable for diverse settings.

There are kits on criminal law, family violence laws, child protection and related issues. They include story telling cards, court wallets and stickers, board games, charts, posters and are able to be flexibly used by service providers with clients and families.
