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Climate Risk Management Guide

- **Risk Management Tool** situated within a broader context of climate justice.
- Applied in conjunction with the CLCQ **First Nations Framework 2025-2030**
- Designed to help CLCs address the complex legal and risk management challenges that climate change presents.
- A tool to help CLCs move from seeing climate and nature risk management as 'nice to have' towards becoming a **strategic focus**. *This is our why.*
- Guide is tailored to CLCs' **unique operational and fiscal environment**. It acknowledges capacity and resources constraints, workforce challenges etc.



Mandatory climate reporting is here


- Australian government introduced **mandatory climate reporting** standards through amendments to *Corporations Act 2001 (Cth)*
- Australia's largest companies are now required by law to disclose climate risks and opportunities that could impact their financial position. This includes information about scope 1, 2, and 3 emissions.
- Disclosing nature-related risks will likely follow in the coming years.
- Reporting must be in line with Australian Sustainability Reporting Standards (ASRS) issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board (AASB).
- Entities registered with the Australian Charities and Not-for-Profits Commission (ACNC) are not required to undertake climate reporting. However, the new laws signal that regulation could reach the non-profit sector in future.

Mandatory climate reporting. Are you ready?

Climate-related financial disclosures are mandated for many Australian companies commencing from 1 January 2025. The climate disclosure standard, AASB S2, is based on the International Sustainability **Standards Board (ISSB)'s climate standards, IFRS S2 and represents the biggest change to corporate reporting in decades**. Companies are expected to disclose climate-related risks and opportunities that will impact their business prospects over the short, medium and long term. We expect that

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
Treasurer Jim Chalmers says a Coalition plan to repeal laws requiring companies to disclose their greenhouse gas emissions will create uncertainty for investors, as business groups warn undoing the new rules will make life harder for firms.

The Australian Financial Review <u>revealed on Thursday</u> the Coalition would scrap new laws that came into effect on January 1 requiring businesses to disclose their greenhouse gas emissions if it won this year's federal election, which must be held by May 17.



What are Scope 1, 2 and 3 emissions?

Greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions within a company's corporate footprint are broken down into Scopes 1, 2 and 3:

- Scope 1 Direct emissions from the company's operations
- Scope 2 Indirect energy emissions
- Scope 3 Other indirect emissions





Evolving duties of legal practitioners

- Increasing expectation on lawyers to develop functional fluency in climate and nature-related risks so that they can advise their clients appropriately.
- Evolving duties of legal practitioners include
 - Duty of care
 - Duty to warn and disclose
 - Duty to uphold service and competency levels
 - 'Climate conscious' legal practice

Practical climate risk governance for CLCs

- Risk management measures and sustainability initiatives are most effective when they are embedded in organisational strategy and processes, rather than being siloed.
- Good to maintain baseline familiarity with the new corporate reporting obligations. Keep an eye on unfolding developments.
- Encourage new Management Committee / Board members to read this Guide as part of their onboarding material.
- CLCQ's <u>Climate Resilience and Adaptive Capacity Checklist</u> is another tool to begin understanding where to direct effort and attention.
